**Data Source: TANF/SNAP/Medicaid** participation are from the South Dakota Department of Social Services. The years are for state fiscal years.

**Data Source: Juvenile Offense Referrals** Court Services Department of the South Dakota Unified Judicial System. **Definitions:** These figures represents the number of youth under eighteen years of age who are referred to the Unified Judicial System (UJS) by the states attorneys.

**Data Source: Commitments to Department of Corrections** Court Services Department of the South Dakota Unified Judicial System. **Definition:** The total number of juveniles committed to the Department of Corrections during the reporting period. The figure includes youth who have had multiple petitions committing them to the Department of Corrections with separate dispositional dates during the reporting period. Figures are by county, which means the county of record in which the judge conducted the adjudication and dispositional proceedings. It can be county of residence or the county where the offense occurred.

**Data Source: Admissions to Drug or Alcohol Treatment Programs** The South Dakota Department of Human Services, Division of Alcohol and Drug Abuse. **Definition:** Admissions include youth under age 18 who received state accredited alcohol and drug services ranging from crisis intervention to structured treatment programs. The person is counted once for every program in which the client participated. However, if a person was admitted to the same program more than once, the person is only counted once.

**Data Source: Youth Related Traffic Statistics** 2010 South Dakota Motor Vehicle Traffic Crash Summary. Department of Public Safety, Accident Records Office.

**Data Source: Demographics**, 1980 and 1990 figures are from the U. S. Census Bureau and obtained from the South Dakota State Data Center. 2000 figures are from Census 2000 Summary File 1 (SF 1) - Table P12. SEX BY AGE [49] - Universe: Total population. 2010 figures are from U.S. Census Bureau 2010 Census. Summary File 1, Table QTP1.

**Data Source: Education** SD Department of Education. Statistics for dropout rates are for grades 7 through 12; enrollment are for pre-kindergarten through grade twelve. **Definitions:** Enrollment:Total number of students enrolled in school on the last Friday of school in September. Dropout rate: Dropout rates are "event dropout rates". The event dropout rate represents the share of students who leave school without completing high school during a single year. The dropout rates for the State of South Dakota districts/schools were calculated by dividing the number of dropouts in the school year by the accumulative enrollment. [accumulative enrollment is the total number of students enrolled in a school year (beginning of the year enrollment plus any students added after that date)].

**Data Source: Health** - South Dakota Department of Health. **Data indicator and Definition:** Infant mortality (rate): The number of deaths of infants under one year of age per 1,000 live births. Child death (rate): The number of deaths for children ages 1-14 per 100,000, from all causes. Low birth weight babies (percent): Low birth weight babies are those born weighing less than 2,500 grams (about 5 and one half pounds). Teen violent death (rate): The number of deaths from homicides, suicides, and accidents to teens ages 15-19 years per 100,000 teens. Births to single teens (percent): The percent of all live births to single females under the age of 20. Women receiving prenatal care (percent): The number of live single births to women receiving prenatal care during the first trimester (first three months) of pregnancy, by county of residence.

**Data Source: National Child Well-Being Indicators:** The KIDS COUNT National Data Book: State Profiles of Child Well-Being, is published each year by the Annie E. Casey Foundation (<http://www.aecf.org>). In its publication, all fifty states are ranked from best to worst. **The 2011 National Data Book, based on 2007/2008/2009 data, ranked South Dakota 21<sup>st</sup> (of 50 states-1 is best; 50 is worst) in child well-being.**
