

WayfindingTOOL

No one is destined for one single job in their life. Unfortunately (or fortunately), we cannot put our goals into a GPS and get turn-by-turn directions for our desired life. What you can do is train yourself to pay attention and make your best way forward with the tools you have at hand. We call this "wayfinding."

How to Wayfind

Paying attention to your engagement and energy provides the initial clues to help you find your way. Tracking (or logging) when you are engaged, energized or bored along with what you are doing during those times forces you to practice paying attention.

This leaves a record that may someday tell a story or show a pattern. Do this daily, or at the very least every few days, for a total of three weeks every semester. Everyone benefits from wayfinding – it helps you understand what makes you confident and what leaves you feeling empty in both big and small ways.


My Good Time Journal

Complete the activity on the right. Be specific about what you are doing. Not just Art Class, but Art Class: figure drawing, or orientation: first meeting with a mentor.

For the engagement and energy gauges, you will draw in the dial pointing at the level you were feeling.

What's that Flow Box?

People "in flow" report experiencing complete involvement in the activity, a sense of euphoria, inner clarity, total calmness or the notion that time is standing still. If you experienced anything like this during an activity, check the box.







About Your Coyote Card

Your Coyote Card and Coyote Card Mobile ID are your most important pieces of identification at USD. This is how you will access your residence hall, use the laundry machines and access your meal plan swipes/ flex to pay for meals in the MUC. It also acts as your library card, gives you access to printing services and more. The Coyote Card Office is located in the I.D. Weeks Library, room 104.





Meal Swipes

Depending on the meal plan you select, your Coyote Card will be equipped with a certain number of swipes to use in the MUC Dining Room each semester. Visit **usd.edu/Dining** to discover specifics on campus dining and the options available to you.



Flex Dollars

In additional to meal swipes, your meal plan may also include flex dollars, which are meal plan dollars that can be spent at dining service locations, concession stands and Charlie's Cupboard. Flex dollars are carried over from fall to spring semesters but do not carry over to the next academic year. If you run out of flex within the year, you may purchase additional add-on flex dollars.



Coyote Cash

Coyote Cash is essentially a debit account that can be used at all on-campus dining locations, as well as many restaurants and businesses in Vermillion. Coyote Cash funds can be used all year round and will remain on your account throughout your time at USD. These funds can also be used at on-campus vending and laundry machines and for printing when Pharos have been depleted.



Pharos

Any USD student with a current Coyote Card and USD username and password can print in any of the labs where Pharos Uniprint is available. There is a \$28 Pharos allotment for each academic year. Once the allotment has been used, you can add Coyote Cash for printing.




What To Expect




