Program to Program Articulation Agreement – WITCC Technical Studies

Upon successful completion of the requirements of the AAS Degree for Technical Studies, **USD will accept a block of forty-nine (49) technical course credits**. In addition to the Technical Studies technical course block credits, general education coursework that transfers as equivalent courses will be transferrable.

Students must meet all Board of Regents policies and university graduation requirements in order to receive a degree.

USD will waive the graduation requirement that 16 of the last 32 credits for the baccalaureate degree must be earned as institutional credit.

Pathway One: Reverse Articulation

(Completing years one and two at USD, years three and four at WITCC, and transferring WITCC Technical Studies credits back to USD for completion of degree)

- A. Students will complete the required Health Sciences Major courses through the University of South Dakota during the first two years of their education. During the third year of their education, they will enter the Technical Studies program at WITCC and complete the requirements for the AAS in Technical Studies at the end of the fourth year.
- B. Upon successful completion of the requirements of the AAS degree Technical Studies, the student will transfer back to USD and apply for graduation. At that time, USD will accept a block of 49 technical course credits in transfer. In addition to the Technical Studies technical course block credits, general education coursework that is equivalent to Regional courses will be transferrable and accepted by USD.
- C. USD will waive the graduation requirement that 16 of the last 32 credits for the baccalaureate degree must be earned as institutional credit.
- D. Students must meet all other Board of Regents and university graduation requirements in order to receive a degree.

Pathway Two: Forward Articulation

(Completing the AAS for Technical Studies at WITCC and transferring to USD to complete the Bachelor of Science in Health Sciences)

- A. Upon successful completion of the requirements of the AAS Technical Studies, students may transfer to USD to complete the BS in Health Sciences. At that time, USD will accept a block of 49 technical course credits from the AAS degree in Technical Studies. Students must successfully complete the AAS degree for Technical Studies from WITCC prior to transferring to USD for the technical course credits to be accepted. Transferable general education coursework in addition to the 49 technical course block credits will also be accepted.
- B. Students will complete the requirements for the Health Sciences Major and any other general education or free elective requirements that remain unsatisfied.
- C. Students must meet all Board of Regents policies and university graduation requirements in order to receive a degree.
